Membership Report - Allen Archibald

Membership increased slightly over the past year, and is now just shy of 400 members (391 to be exact). This includes 92 members from the South Shore Road Association; 20 members from the Silver Mine Road Association and 21 members from the Kashwakamak Cottage Association, the vast majority of which pay their membership dues through their association.

Once again, I would like to extend a very special thanks to John Hart, Bill Roffey, and Miriam McKeown for bringing their road association members into the Kashwakamak Lake Association. This creates a lot of extra bookkeeping work for them, but has made my job of collecting annual dues much easier.

E-mail Communication

Our efforts to expand our e-mail communication with the members continue, with a total of 23 messages sent out in 2010 and a further 14 messages so far this year. These messages have included monthly Alerts from FOCA; Watershed Bulletins from Mississippi Valley Author-

ity; reminders of scheduled KLA events; notices of community presentations and talks provided by local authorities; and information to keep you informed as to municipal elections, the slow evolution of high speed internet, the status of water levels in spring and fall, and the availability of electronic maps of the lake.

Our e-mail capable members now number 272 or 70% of the total membership. In addition, we provide for the opportunity to send emails to family members, which today has added another 58 folk who receive KLA related news. We respect the fact that some members are still using dial-up, and if we are aware of their transmission speed, we do not send them large files. We leave it to you to make sure we know that you use dial-up.

Unfortunately, there are some e -mail addresses that are no longer valid, either temporally or permanently. Time does not permit us to phone the member to check his/her e-mail address, so we ask you to let us know of any changes. If you haven't received

Treasurer's Report - Allen Archibald

Included in this Newsletter mailing is the audited Financial Statement of the Association for 2010, together with notes explaining some of the details.

You will note that the cash balance decreased by \$3,762.42. This occurred as a result of a number of factors, the first being that the revenues were understated by \$1,080 because of two payments due in 2010 but received in early 2011. The second factor is the upgrade in the quality of the Spring and Fall Newsletter packages. We

now print the Newsletter in colour, and when appropriate, include new material for the benefit of the KLA Members. Unfortunately postal rates have increased and with the weightier packages, total postage costs have increased significantly. A third factor is the addition of Family Day, where the KLA (as well as others) accepted the financial risk to put on the extremely well received event, although in respect to the format that was used, was not a financial success. We will be changing the cost format this year.

The policy of your Board is that all monies received from Silent Auctions (held at the annual KLA dinner) are given to a Charity. Over the past couple of years the collection and then payment of these monies has not occurred in the same calendar year. We will attempt to resolve this situation in 2011.

All other costs and revenues are in line with the normal functioning of the Association.

..... **Membership Fees Increased to \$15**

Last fall your Board, after much debate, decided that in order to continue to improve the functioning of the Association and expand the benefits offered to its members, a fee increase was necessary. It was

further decided not to wait until the AGM (June 2011) to present this request for a vote; rather it was decided to use a mail/e-mail vote request sent to all members. Of the membership who cast a vote, 88% voted in favour of a fee increase from \$10 to \$15 annually.

For those members who have pre-paid future years, we thank you. We will NOT require that you make up the difference. For those very few members who are in arrears, please note that prior years should be paid at \$10, and payments for 2011 and beyond will be at \$15.

For those members who are a member of the Kashwakamak Cottage Association, the Silver Mine Road Association, or the South Shore Road Association and who pay their KLA fees through these road associations, they will be directed by their road association. For the rest of you, we look forward to

receiving your KLA Fees for 2011 for \$15.

Please note that cheques are made out to: Kashwakamak Lake Association and mailed to: Kashwakamak Lake Association, RR #1, Arden, Ontario; K0H 1B0.

The decision for a fee increase is supported by several factors: the Board's desire to expand the Association's delivery of benefits to the membership, together with a need to recognize that costs have been escalating over the years while the membership fees have remained static for at least 10 years. The use of willing volunteers coupled with some costs borne by others have helped keep the costs over the years as low as they have been but this could not be sustained any longer.

KLA Constitution to be Amended - Vote at AGM

At the Annual General Meeting on July 9th, 2011 we will be voting on the amended constitution. Members have been provided a copy of the draft constitution with their spring mailing from the KLA. We ask that members review the constitution as we will be voting on it at the AGM.

Please note the following highlighted changes to the constitution:

Membership – There would now be 3 levels of membership (active, associate and honorary). Active membership is limited to one person per registered property on the lake. Each active member will have one vote on each motion put forth. Voting will be done by voting cards, which will be distributed at meetings where voting will take place.

Directors - We have added a section on proportional representation which highlights our objective to have Directors on the board from all areas of the lake.

We have also added a paragraph about directors not receiving any remuneration as well as a paragraph stating that the association will follow Robert's Rules of Order. Both of these are very standard paragraphs for a constitution. Judy McIntryre, KLA Director

Loon Watch Surveys

Our loon watch surveys contribute to a nation-wide bird research program, which also helps lake associations in their future planning to ensure lake quality and environmental health, etc. Participants in Canadian Loon Surveys have collected information on nesting loons since 1981, with KLA having some on our lake since 1990.

Reproductive success is consistently higher in western regions of Canada than in Ontario and the eastern provinces. In the past acid rain is believed to have played a part in this. Loons are considered to be helpful in showing the health of lake environments like the canary in the coal mine. Diagnosing the causes of loon mortality can often help us to detect pollutants and track the spread of diseases such as Avian Flu and West Nile Virus.

In past research on loons found dead, but in good body condition, causes of death include trauma, which could be from impact with motorboats, drowning in gill nets, and tangling in cast-off fishing line. Birds in poor body condition had a variety of disease problems – often 2 or 3 in the same bird. The leading problems included botulism, chronic lead poisoning from ingesting lead sink-



ers, respiratory infection in lungs, oil contamination on plumage, intestinal parasites and high level of mercury in tissues.

We now have the results of our data sent in to Bird Studies Canada since 2004 when our Association joined Bird Studies Canada. The collected data from the 5-year information and even looking back 10 years doesn't tell us a lot. However the trend does appear to be a concern as Kathy Jones, the Bird Studies volunteer co-ordinator for the Loon Watch program explained. There is a fairly low reproductive rate. Loons do not mate until 4 years of age, and then only produce 1 or 2 eggs.

Human activity directly affects the loon survival rate by disrupting natural shore lines, leading to fewer foraging areas, nesting sites and protective cover. Wakes from watercraft may flood nests, and this along with noise levels may even cause parents to abandon their nest. Even camping on islands can disturb loons. We need to preserve wild parts of our lake as much as possible.

At the best of times, loons will always be under environmental attack, from water level fluctuations, natural predators and excessive human activity. Predators such as raccoons, skunks, and bears affect the survival of loons. Even a gull can snatch a baby chick from between its parents on the water.

Ignoring the Annual Dinner, the major expenditures of the KLA include FOCA and the Spring & Fall Newsletters. The Annual Dinner held in September is ignored because it is a "flow-through" item, meaning all costs are borne by the attendees.

Membership in FOCA (Federation of Ontario Cottagers' Associations) costs the KLA approximately \$3.11 per member. It is an association

The main communication instruments from the KLA to its members are the Spring and Fall Newsletter pack-

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tional inserts such as the Boating Card and a Family Day poster advertisement, plus additional postage made up the difference. Although there will be fewer inserts this year, the Board has decided not to return to the black & white format. Rather it is intended to make greater use of our e-mail members who have the capacity to receive the Spring Newsletter package by e-mail. Their willingness will have a major impact on future costs.

The Family Day event is not a function that we intend to support annually; rather the cost structure will be changed so that it should from now on be close to a "flow-through" item. However, Family Day does provide an example of the Board taking on a financial risk to provide additional benefits to the members. Lessons learned are applied in subsequent years.

Finally there is the issue of "cash-flow". Typically KLA fee revenue crests in July, primarily in response to the fees reminder sent out in the Spring

Newsletter issued in June. Unfortunately, the biggest annual expense is the Spring Newsletter package itself. Hence, the problem is with the expense being incurred before the supporting revenues are received. Over the years, with the strength of the bank balance, this has not been a problem. However, last years' expenses reduced the cash balance significantly, and now must be re-built.

Before I leave the subject of the fee increase, I would like to offer a big thank-you to those volunteers who provide invaluable service to the Association, and by extension to each Member, so that we do not need to hire outside services and incur additional expenses.

Septic Re-inspection Program

In 2010, 102 septic re-inspections were done in N. Frontenac Township by Eric Kohlsmith, the Septic Inspector for the Mississippi Rideau Re-inspection Program. This was the 6th year of the voluntary program and although it has changed over the years, the focus on older systems and waterfront properties has remained constant.

It was found beneficial to schedule appointments so that property owners could be present during the inspection.

About half the inspections in 2010 were done on Brule Lake, 15 on Buckshot, 12 on Little Marble and the rest on a number of other lakes such as Kashwakamak.

Out of the systems inspected, 31 required some remedial work and 6 were handed over to the Health Unit as needing replacement. It was found that the age of the system was not as important to its well-being as proper maintenance.

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AGM to Highlight a Proposal for a "Kashwakamak Lake Sustainability Plan"

Last year, the Kashwakamak Lake Association members heard a presentation from Alyson Symon from the Mississippi Valley Conservation Authority and Peigi Wilson, a local environmental specialist from Crow Lake about lake planning.

They explained that this is a process where a lake community comes together to share what they value as well as their concerns. This is done in an effort to develop a plan for the sustainability of the lake. The term "Sustainability" means making sure future generations have access to the same opportunities and quality of life that we currently enjoy.

Broadband Update

Omniglobe Networks have provided fixed wireless internet to western parts of the township. Under rural broadband funding programs, they received a grant to install equipment on the TVO Tower north of Cloyne and erected several repeater towers. On December 23, 2010 the lake was 18" above winter level and frozen several inches thick. This high level was caused by late fall rain. The level slowly receded to normal, leaving a thick layer of ice along the shore and on dock structures.

In early May I took water samples from the east basin and have begun the twice a month secchi disc test.

Again, the usual reminder, using less water means less run off from your septic. Use phosphate free detergents and most importantly DO NOT use fertilizer on your lawn!!

At last report our lake is in good condition so let's not spoil it. The water temperature is going up! So go jump in the lake!

Members of the public will be able to meet with the consultant and staff during the day and will have an opportunity to make representations in respect of the proposed By-law. A PUBLIC MEETING will be held – at a date to be announced - to provide the public with an opportunity to provide input on the proposed changes.

Update on New Fire Hall in Ompah

The County/Township proposal to build an Ambulance Base and Fire Hall in Ompah seemed to generate the most controversy this winter. The two Ward 1 Councillors were reported as making injudicious remarks, which added fuel to the fire.

This project has been ongoing since the last Council and seemed to be stalled over what percentage of the cost the Township and County should pay. The County is now concerned with the ongoing maintenance and upkeep costs whereas the Township just wants to get construction started. There will be no progress before the next County meeting in July.

Construction and Building Permits

In 2010 the dollar value of construction (\$8 million) rebounded from the two previous years. However, the number of permits taken out for major construction on waterfront properties has been on a steady decline for the last five vears. This is of concern because this is the key sector in the Township's construction industry.

How to help our **Loon population**

Responsible boating:

Excessive noise and wakes can disturb the loon nests. Wakes can also cause unnecessary shoreline erosion, destroying natural foraging and refuge areas.

Budget and Taxes

North Frontenac Township will be spending \$450,000 more this year and education taxes are up by \$50,000. Transfer payments from the Provincial government were cut this year by \$117,000, but the County payment is down by \$70,000.

The total tax to be collected is up by 7.2% in 2011.

The increase is due in large part to putting more money into reserve funds to replace tangible township assets. A new tandem truck will be bought this year and money has been set aside for the new fire hall in Ompah.

The levy increase will hit water-

front ratepayers harder than inland residents, since property assessment increases on waterfront properties continue to

shift the tax burden in that direction.

The total value of property assessment in the township is up by \$56 million this year, the bulk of which comes from waterfront property reassessment.

Official Plan

No More Private Lanes

The draft Official Plan has been returned twice from the Ontario Ministry of Municipal Affairs with requests for altered wording. Glenn Tunnock, the Township planner, recently appeared at a Council meeting to highlight the issues. One contentious issue has been a Ministry demand that new building lots are no longer to be permitted on private lanes. The only options for development would be plans of subdivision or plans of condominiums, both of which are costly. Roads would have to be constructed to a Township standard and finally taken over by the Township. The Township has no choice but to accept this.

Allowable Lot Sizes

The other issue is lot size, particularly for waterfront properties. The Township minimum is 1 acre, but the Province has set 1 hectare (2.47 acres) as the standard. This is to ensure that there is enough space for septic beds and setbacks on rocky sites. The Planner stated that he thought the Province would accept a compromise of 0.8 hectares (2 acres) lot size with a 30 metre natural buffer from any shoreline.

This is an issue that your KLA Board is following closely. Central Frontenac Township has a minimum lot size of 1 hectare (2.47 acres) on waterfront lots with a minimum frontage of 300 ft. In North Frontenac the minimum frontage is 147ft. If North Frontenac does not increase their waterfront lot size, our lakes will become a haven for developers, where they can have more lots on the same amount of property.

KLA supports the Alliance of Lake Associations in its efforts to have North Frontenac increase the lot size.

The current By-law needs updating to conform to the new Official Plan.
