

Dear Fellow KLA Members,

Well another summer cottage

season has come to a close. We started out with high water and with all of the rain it never seemed to decrease through the summer months. The fall however has been exceptional with higher than normal temperatures and little rain.

The trees did not seem to get into the fall colours until a couple of weeks ago, much later than in the past.

have been mostly positive. There is likely always going to be someone who does not obey the marine law and appreciate the KLA's efforts to educate people about no-wake zones. Please remember that in addition to motor boats, jet skis create wakes too. If you rent your place or have boating guests please explain to them that 10 km/hour is the law within 100 feet of shore and in narrow few and the KLA has asked this to passages and sensitive areas "no -wake" is a must.

What is a Regular Membership?

Our advertising revenue continues to grow thanks to the efforts of our Vice-President Judy McIntyre. Many cottagers are now using Interac and it is a time saver for both the sender and KLA as it goes directly into our bank account.

There are still membership fees

outstanding so if you have not paid your 2017 annual membership dues, please remember to do so at your earliest convenience. Our membership fee billing for 2018 will be sent out in January, 2018. Please note that payments made through Interac may be charged a small service fee depending on your bank.

Our bank balance as at September 30th is \$5,601. We will be paying our FOCA fees before the end of the year which is approximately \$1,375. We will also set aside a reserve of \$2,000 for 2018 Lake Sustainability imple-

mentation costs as voted on at our August Director's meeting.

Lake Steward's Report - Peter Johnson

Wow what a tease! After having a cool and wet spring and summer we end up with a tropical September and October. Better late than never. With that said it's our bay which is also something always great to be on the lake regardless of what Mother Nature throws at us.

When the Secchi readings are taken I always record lake temperatures. On September 24th the water temperature was 79

Mitchell Bay and Whitefish Bay, which is the warmest I've seen this summer. Matt and I swam we've never done so late in the season. In contrast, mid to late August water temperatures were as low as 72 degrees F.

The water clarity this year was significantly reduced over some previous years. Visibility dropped to 4 meters from an average of 5.

I really noticed it when I was snorkeling. Possibly all that rain we had and the run off that came with it had an im-

degrees Fahrenheit (old school) in pact. That's what I'm blaming my less than stellar fishing success on this year, but it's likely me. All the same, we will be keeping an eye on the phosphate results that will be posted late this fall.

MVCA Update: Water Levels

The KLA's editor reached out to Gord Mountenay in late September to get an update on water levels and plans for the annual draw down. Below is an excerpt of the reply received from Gord Mountenay.

"With all of the rain that we had this year, water levels were at or above the target levels for the lake all summer and at no time this summer were all the logs in Kashwakamak Lake dam, something that hasn't happened for several years and a far cry from what we experienced last year. The fall drawdown has begun and levels are expected to drop as usual over the next two months. At this time, we are not contemplating any significant changes to the drawdown rates or timing from historical norms. If you have any additional comments or concerns, please do not hesitate to contact me."

Kashwakamak Lake Loon Study - Fall 2017

There were constant water levels this season, but a late cold spring with stormy weather created a later than usual nesting period. Loon reports were very minimal and your Loon Master could only legitimize 5 new young loons. One was sighted early July in the Narrow. Two (twins) were sighted on August 3rd opposite Fernleigh Lodge and 2 (twins)

were sighted on August 14th in Brown's Bay.

It is important that boaters keep in mind that their wake could disturb loon nesting. By slowing down and "Please keep away from the loons and any nesting sites from mid-May to early July

avoiding any known loon nesting areas, our loons will have a better chance.


NEW: MVCA Watershed Conditions



The KLA recently learned that staff at the MVCA report watershed conditions to the MVCA Board at each of their meetings. The KLA is now receiving theses reports and will share them via email and post them on the **Members Only** Portal after they have been presented at their meetings and considered public documents. Here is a summary of the reports from July, September and October 2017:

Watershed Conditions as of July 10, 2017

Following the flooding in May, conditions across the entire watershed have remained higher than normal. With above average precipitation continuing into June and July (see graph), lake levels have yet to settle down to summer target levels. The majority of the upper lakes in the watershed remain 10 cm to 15 cm above summer targets, while the lower reach of the system, including the Carp River remains well above historical normals. (...) Watershed dams continue to be operated as excess water is moved through the system. 284 dam operations have taken place due to the spring floods and continuing rains, having already surpassed the average annual number of dam trips of 238. A total of 3 water conditions high water statements and 1 flood watch statement have been issued for the month of July.



With precipitation remaining in the long range forecast, and already saturated soil conditions, we expect higher than normal conditions to continue for the month of July and into August.

This graph provides a comparison to 2017 average monthly rainfall amount and the historical monthly average.

Fireworks

There is also a growing awareness that fireworks are an environmentally damaging activity that affects the health of our lake, plants, animals and our drinking water. Fireworks are constructed using cardboard, metal, plastic and are powered by gunpowder.

To produce the pyrotechnics and colours, very high temperatures burn heavy metals and chemicals, including: arsenic, strontium, barium, cadmium, rubidium, copper, and aluminum. The cardboard, metal and plastic that fall to the ground or into the lake with residual gunpowder, heavy metals and chemicals contaminate the lake, forest, and potentially our drinking water. We all know the impact fireworks have on pets, (especially older dogs), but what is the impact on loons and other birds and mammals? This is certainly something to consider if we

want to protect what we all hold

ahead.



As part of this initiative, the KLA also purchased and installed "No Wake" markers at several critical spots on the lake where there are narrow passage ways and the shore line is

Don't move the Markers!

less than 100 metres wide.

Over the summer several markers were moved by people who were NOT KLA volunteers. Both the yellow hazard markers and the No Wake markers are the property of the Kashwakamak Lake Association. The KLA has insurance which covers these markers and they are placed carefully in accordance with Ontario's Marine Safety Rules.

If you have an issue with a hazard or No Wake marker placement or if one is missing, please email president@kashwakamak.ca. The Board will be reviewing the placement of ALL markers at our May board meeting and will adjust them accordingly.

Did you know?

If you are driving a motor boat or a personal water craft then you already have an **Ontario Pleasure**Craft Operator Card and know the rules.

If it's been a while since your test, here's a quick refresher:

⇒ Ontario's Marine Safety Law rules state that the speed limit is 10 km/hour within 30 metres or 98' 5" from shore.

Note: This rule is in effect whether it is posted or not.

What does "No Wake" mean?

There were a lot of comments and some confusion over what "No Wake" means.

- ⇒ A "No Wake Zone" is a designated area where boats are prohibited from making waves.
- ⇒ When you see a "No Wake" it's time to slow your motor boat or personal watercraft down to 10 km/hour or less to ensure that no wake is produced.
- ⇒ To do this, the engine must be put into idle speed when you're entering the designated zone.
- ⇒ Idle speed means the lowest speed a boat can safely operate while maintaining control of steering.

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




Watershed Conditions as of Sept. 11

Water levels have remained at or slightly above their summer target levels for the month of August and into September. (...) Rainfall amounts for this year continue to grow with a total of 1060 mm (42 in) hitting the watershed so far. These amounts have already exceeded the watersheds typical annual amount of 900 mm (36 in). (...) It is expected that higher than normal flows and levels will continue into the fall.

The following graph provides this years flow conditions for the Mississippi River compared to historical flows.



Watershed Conditions as of Oct. 11

With all of the rain that we had this year, water levels were at or above target levels for the majority of the lakes from May through September. Dams were operated all summer long and for the first time in many years the system never had all the stoplogs in all the dams at any point through the summer. We exceeded our typical number of annual dam operations by June and we are expecting that we will set an all-time high for total number of trips to dams for operation in 2017. As of October 11, we have undertaken 353 trips to dams for the purpose of removing or replacing stoplogs, the historical average of 238 trips and we have just begun the start of our fall drawdowns on most of the lakes.

Drawdowns on Shabomeka and Pine lakes as well as the Carleton Place dam began, as normal, on or about the 15th of September (this year was September 18) and are now complete. The drawdown of Shabomeka Lake usually results in increased levels on Mazinaw Lake so that dam has been operated to maintain levels as close as possible to the optimum level for this time of year.

The drawdown of Kashwakamak, Mississagagon, Big Gull, Summit and Widow Lakes started after the Thanksgiving weekend, as normal, and levels are expected to drop as they typically would over the next two months. The drawdown on Mazinaw Lake will actually not start until early November to ac-

count for boat traffic during hunting sea-

son.

Crotch Lake is currently about a meter above the historical average for this time of year. This is due to the maintenance being done at the High Falls Generating Station, which is expected to be completed this week or next and the station will come back online sometime in October. The initial drawdown from the upper lakes has not impacted water levels yet on Crotch Lake which continues to drop at this time. We anticipate that the fall flows in the main stem of the Mississippi River

will be higher than normal through the remainder of this year as this additional water is moved through the system. At this time, we are not contemplating any significant changes to the drawdown rates or timing from historical norms. All dams will be operated through the fall and winter to try to maintain levels within the normal operating rule curves for the structures.

Fire Safety 101

Our two presenters were very informative. Fire Chief Casey Cuddy gave an interesting presentation which highlighted the importance of the following:

- ⇒ 911 access to your cottage is critical! Make sure your roads are clear and passable by truck. If you're on a side lane, make sure to let 911 know.
- ⇒ Volunteer Fire fighters have GREEN flashing lights on their vehicles. Please treat them as you would any emergency vehicle.
- ⇒ Camp fires are the leading cause of forest fires because they are often improperly set up. Illegal and careless burning is the second cause.
- ⇒ It's best to build camp fires on bare rock or a bed of gravel or mineral soil.
- ⇒ In 2017 there were 2 structure fires. One was caused by alcohol and smoking and the second was from a dryer duct.

Some Interesting Stats:

The Kaladar/Barrie Fire department responded to 170 calls in 2016:

- o 31% medical
- o 18% By law enforcement
- o 8% False alarms
- o 7% Public Hazards

Editor's Note: We don't have statistics for Kashwakamak Lake as 911 calls are not broken down by lake.

Did you know?

- o In 46% of fires where children die is because there are no smoke alarms.
- People have no sense of smell when they are asleep, thus the importance of smoke alarms.
- Smoke alarms are required by law in bunkies, trailers as well as on all levels of a dwelling separating sleeping areas from living areas.
- In new construction, smoke alarms are required in both sleeping and living areas.
- CO2 detectors are required in any dwelling with combustion, i.e. wood stove or gas stove. This includes attached garages.
- o You should test your CO2 and Smoke Alarms each time you come back, change the batteries in the spring, and take them out in the fall if you're closing up for the season.
- ⇒ A fire ban is determined through fire weather indices and is scientifically done.
- ⇒ A fire ban means **no**:

Chimeneas, outdoor camp fires, incinerators, burn barrels, Chinese Lanterns, or cooking fires (gas installations or charcoal within 100 metres of a dwelling or cottage is permitted however, do not dispose of charcoal ash until it is cold for 12 hours). If you're camping, use propane gas grills.

Snapping Turtles are at Risk!

Our second presenter was Graham Cameron, the Management Biologist for the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF) in Bancroft. Graham gave a very interesting and engaging presentation about snapping turtles and one incredible voyage.

Did you know?

- ◆ Turtles are slow growers. They grow about .7 cm for about 6 - 30 years and will weigh about 4 kg after 30 years.
- ◆ The average turtle lives between 16 21 years.
- Turtles mature late and have low reproductive success.
- The MNRF has tracked one turtle since 1973 marked B07.
- B07 has laid 1760 eggs but none have hatched due to natural predators.
- Snapping turtles go on migratory journeys each year when then cross from hibernation sites into summer habitats where they begin to nest.
 Mortality exceeds their growth so turtle are AT RISK due to cars!


New Lodge Book for Sale



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
