Looking to our western neighbours dealing with the unthinkable wild fires gives us reason to seriously consider reducing the fuel available around our cottages. I urge you educate yourself on what you can do to reduce your risk from forest fire. The internet, FOCA and our local fire department can help provide answers.



With a shorter, warmer winter ice break up came earlier. The loons came back to Kashwakamak Lake ahead of their usual April 20th homecoming. The first loon sighting of April 11th reported by the Meraw's of Five Views and Randy Baker set our earliest recorded return.

Lake levels affected our loon population in 2015 with no hatchlings reported. Floating loon platforms may be our only solution to maintain a safe and reproductive loon population on our lake. Platforms need to be placed

Lake Sustainability Update



Dock Permits now required!

FOCA Elert: Property owners should take note that according to multiple MNRF sources, including <u>mnr.approval@ontario.ca</u>, the current rules require authorization under the Public Lands Act to construct, place or replace a dock or boathouse that occupies (i.e., that is on or above) more than 15 square meters of shore lands. The area of shore lands occupied by a dock or boathouse will typically be calculated based on the perimeter of the structure.

Individuals who wish to construct or place docks or boathouses that occupy more than 15 square meters of shore land should contact their local MNRF District Office to initiate the formal application process.

Water Level Update – Interview with Gord Mountenay, MVCA

This spring's water levels wreaked havoc with many people on the lake this spring. The KLA was in contact with MVCA's Gord Mountenay, Water Management Supervisor early on in the season and again on May 16th during our Lake Sustainability Committee meeting to ask him about the situation. Here's a transcript of the conversation.

KLA: Gord, the dock damage many cottages had this spring is probably the biggest issue that our Association members are concerned about. What caused all the ice damage to docks on the lake this spring?

Gord Mountenay: I can tell you that when we were making decisions to operate the dams we knew there was a potential for a lot of ice damage. But at the time, given the conditions we had and the long range forecast calling for a hot, dry spring and a hot dry summer we felt we didn't have a choice. Mid-March it appeared that the snow was gone and all forecasters were predicting a drier warmer spring and drier hotter summer. Dam operations began slowly to catch some runoff from the snow melt while trying to ensure there was still room in the lake for rainfall and being aware that the ice was still on the lakes. It appeared that Mazinaw Lake actually peaked and was beginning to drop by late March. From March 17 to March 29, a total of six logs (of 12 that were out) were put back in Kashwakamak Lake dam, two of those on March 29 to offset 2 logs being replaced in Mazinaw Lake Dam on the same day. On March 29, the 5 day weather forecast had 3 mm rain for March 30 and 9 mm rain for March 31, followed by a week of very cold temperatures. The plan was to hold Kashwakamak Lake at approximately 260.80 m through mid-April, leaving roughly 35 cm of storage or area to fill to meet summer levels for the end of May. On March 31st in excess of 60 mm of rain fell over the upper watershed. By April 5th the six logs that had been replaced were back out. Mazinaw Lake had exceeded the upper operating range of the lake as had virtually every other lake in the upper watershed. We are now at, or slightly above summer target levels with all logs back in all the dams and the plan now is to try to maintain stable levels at the summer target through to the end of September. Whether we had put the logs in or not, the rain from March 31st and the run off that we had would still have caused the ice to move and we would have had ice damage regardless. With the volume of water coming into the system that quickly, there would have been ice damage either way.

KLA: People have been concerned about water levels before. Is it the same issue?

Gord Mountenay: In March, from a water management point of view we're trying to manage

the system to meet several objectives. Those include flooding, ice and erosion damage, fisheries and wildlife as well as the recreational target levels required for the end of May. We are dealing with weather and it is never consistent from year to year. We're making our predictions for operations sometimes in early March like this year. Last year it was later. Last year we still had snow in the middle of April but it all sublimated so we didn't get any run off. It looked like all the snow was gone by the end of March and we weren't going to get very much runoff this year either. Then we got the rain storm on the 31st.

I'm expecting now that we're heading into a drought. It looks like we're going to have a hot, dry summer and we'll have a really difficult time managing the lakes and keeping our lakes at recreational levels through to September.

At this point, Little Marble and Marble lakes are low with very little water flowing out of Mazinaw Lake to maintain or bring them up. The long weekend in May is considered by us as the start of the recreation season (from a water management perspective) and we are still a week away from that. If we start releasing water now and don't get any more then we run out earlier. We're trying to meet as many goals as we can with what Mother Nature gives us. It's not getting any easier to do that. We're not getting the "April showers bring May flowers anymore". The last few years we have been getting our rains in June and July, not April and May.

KLA: What about the issue of permanent docks?

Gord Mountenay: With the change in weather patterns the MVCA has been promoting the use of floating, removable docks as a preference now for some time on all dam controlled lakes.

KLA: Gord, we also heard about the Kashwakamak Lake dam needing to be repaired for \$1.2 million and that as rate payers, property owners might have to pay for it. Can you clarify the situation please?

Gord Mountenay: The article that appeared in the *Frontenac News* is a slightly skewed version of what actually happened at our board meeting. One discussion at our Policy and Priorities Advisory Committee meeting on April 18th centered around the policy of whether we continue the practice of paying for rebuilding our structures through the current practice of 'General Benefitting Basis' where the benefit is determined by the relative assessment within each municipality or do we consider other options such as a special benefitting levy for capital projects. If it was deemed that a project was only benefitting a particular municipality, that municipality could be charged the majority of the cost of the project. Kashwakamak Lake dam was selected for discussion but there are four dams within North Frontenac that will need either major repairs or complete replacement in the coming years.

There were other options raised as well and staff were directed to conduct a cost-benefit analysis of the proposed policy in relation to the capital costs of rebuilding a representative dam in the Mississippi River watershed.

We're a long way from making a decision on that policy. We don't have any conclusions at this time and are just beginning to investigate our options to see what can be done and what is reasonable. It is not a done deal.

KLA: What's the timing for fixing the Kash lake dam?

Gord Mountenay: I don't know. We have 5 dams in the system that are going to have to be rebuilt or have major repair work and 4 of those are in North Frontenac Township. We've been looking at these dams for a number of years, but it's very difficult to raise the capital to do the work. None of these are in imminent danger of catastrophic failure but they are all very close to the end of their lifespan so we can't wait 50 years. We're trying to figure out how to do that.

We've got to prioritize them and figure out how to pay for the work. There will be public meetings to discuss the options if they are rebuilt and get feedback on design if the replacement dam is different from the current configuration. It's not something that's going to be taking place this year or next year.

KLA: Who should we deal with around questions and concerns about funding?

Gord Mountenay: Paul Lehman our General Manager is responsible for all the budget issues. We are looking at possible federal funding from the infrastructure program. But we're not at a point to say how we're going to proceed.

This operation of the system went through a complete review through the Water Management Planning Process from 2002 to 2007. The dams that we are talking about here, (Shabomeka, Mazinaw, Kashwakamak, Big Gull and Mississagagon) were all part of that process because they were deemed to have an impact on water levels and flows throughout the length of the Mississippi River system. We operate those dams as a system to meet the overall objectives of the system, flood control, low flow augmentation, fisheries and wildlife, water quality, recreation and hydro generation. There are a few dams that only affect a specific area or lake (Pine Lake and Bennett Lake for example), but they aren't any of the ones we are talking about that need replacing.

In my opinion, going back to a previous question, I think there is history there and a lot of back ground information that would indicate the dams shouldn't be 100% paid for by a municipality.

KLA: What can we expect for future water level management?

Gord Mountenay: I know people are upset about the ice damage to their docks. This is not going to go away this year. Unfortunately ice damage will become a more common occurrence than it was 20 or 30 years ago with climate change.

KLA: How can our members stay informed about water levels?

Gord Mountenay: We update the media regularly and we post the water levels on our website daily. People can go to the Water Resource tab and then Water Management which links over to the Water Levels: <u>http://mvc.on.ca/water-levels/</u> (Editor's Note: there is now a link to MVCA water levels on the www.kashwakamak.ca website).

KLA: What can we do to let the MVCA know about our concerns around paying for a new dam?


Bus Pick Up

MVCA – New Lake Temperature Monitoring Project

The KLA is delighted to report that Peter Burbidge from our Lake Sustainability Planning Committee has volunteered to take on a lake temperature monitoring station as part of a new pilot project being launched this spring by the Mississippi Valley Conservation Authority (MVCA). The goal of this project is to undertake continuous lake water temperature monitoring using simple temperature loggers that are left in the water and attached to an anchor and float. *"We are starting this year by testing the loggers on Kashwakamak Lake (1 logger), Dalhousie Lake (1 logger), Sharbot Lake (1 logger), Canonto Lake (1 logger) and Mississippi Lake (2 loggers),"* reported Alyson Symon, the MVCA's Watershed Planner. *"I'm delighted that Peter Burbidge has agreed to allow us to install a logger at his waterfront,"* she commented. *"I've enjoyed working with Peter as part of the KLA's Lake Sustainability Planning Committee."*

Water Temperature Loggers

The MVCA is initiating a pilot project to undertake continuous water temperature monitoring on lakes within the watershed. Information will help long term monitoring of the impacts of climate change. The data could also help in understanding of factors influencing incidence of blue-green algae occurrences. Details at a glance:

- $\Rightarrow\,$ Starting in 2016 with Mississippi Lake, Dalhousie Lake, Canonto Lake, Sharbot Lake and Kashwakamak Lake.
- \Rightarrow Temperature loggers are secured using a cinder block anchor with a buoy on a chain.
- \Rightarrow Locational requirements of 1.5 to 2 metre depth of water in a spot somewhat protected from boat traffic and tampering.
- \Rightarrow Loggers will be installed sometime between May 24th and May 27th
- \Rightarrow Property owner is just asked to keep an eye on the logger to make sure it isn't moved, removed or damaged.
- \Rightarrow MVCA staff will stop in once during the summer at a prearranged time to check the logger. Property owners may also be contacted periodically by email to check-in.
- \Rightarrow All loggers will be removed in the fall.
