bour or family member who might fit the bill.


AGM

I encourage you all to come to this year's AGM on Saturday July 13. The highlights of the agenda are on page 1 of this newsletter and we'll share more information via email in June. We are very pleased with the line-up and think you will be too!

Proposed Membership Fee Increase

One item of note is the vote to get member approval for a \$5 member-ship fee increase to a total of \$20. I want you to know that the Board deliberated carefully on key considerations for this request including the FOCA fee increase, the KLA's large membership base relative to many other lake associations, the modest contingency fund needs of a non-profit, and our reliance on paid advertisers to keep fees low. We will include an option to vote by proxy if you aren't able to attend the meeting.

The Board unanimously agreed that a \$5 increase would offset increased costs and provide a modest contingency. We noted that this small membership fee increase would not preclude seeking an increase in future years based upon significant changes such as: a major drop in revenue (e.g., newsletter advertising), any compelling opportunities for larger investments in lake sustainability; or, if services currently donated by volunteers (bookkeeping, newsletter advertising requests, marker maintenance etc.), had to instead be provided by paid contractors.

Lake Steward's Report - Pete Johnson

Well, that was a winter for the storybooks. It was the mildest I can remember with minimal snow load in the woods and on the snowmobile trails. Ice thickness was far less than normal as well. Ice off usually occurs in the second week of April. This picture was taken in the center of the lake opposite Brown's Bay on March 20th.

There are some concerns with early ice off. One concern is that lake stratification can occur sooner, resulting in lower O2 levels at the deeper levels of the lake earlier in the season. This is not good for aquatic life. Another problem could be the lake heating quicker and reaching higher temperatures than normal, possibly causing more algae growth issues.

MVCA 2023 Integrated Water Monitoring Report

Kashwakamak Lake was part of MVCA's 2023 5-year cyclic Integrated Water Monitoring Efforts. Samples were taken in May, July and September in the east and west basins of Kashwakamak Lake. Total phosphorus level average was 6.8 micrograms/l with levels slightly higher in the

west basin than the east. Water clarity was slightly less in the west basin as compared to the east as well. Of the 11 lakes in the Mazinaw and upper Mississippi River water shed sampled last year Kashwakamak was amongst the lowest for total phosphorus with no disturbing trends. Anything less than 10 micrograms/L is considered good.

Good news!

I've been in contact with Kelly Stiles the biologist for MVCA and she says Kashwakamak lake is holding steady with low nutrient levels and good secchi depths.

While there may be year-to-year variations, there are no overall directional trends in the data. She encourages properly owners around the lake to appreciate these good conditions and continue to maintain shoreline and lake health stewardship like the tree day event occurring on June 1st with order pick ups at Fernleigh Lodge and Woodcrest Resort.

Voluntary "FREE" Septic Re-Inspection Program

The KLA encourages you to book now for your free Septic Re-Inspection! The primary focus of this program is to educate property owners about their onsite waste treatment systems and any deficiencies with it. Overall, the Re-inspection Program aids in keeping our lakes and groundwater pollution free. Systems that are improperly maintained, older, outdated or malfunctioning may have a negative impact on our water.

In 2023, Kashwakamak Lake accounted for 65% of the properties that were re-inspected under this program - 23 properties in all. Thanks to all of our members who participated! Lets keep it up in 2024.

You will be happy to note that a key tenant of the Plan is a continuing commitment to "environmental conservation."

Reminder – Lights Out Please

As you return to the lake for the summer season – a reminder to leave the city lights behind. North Frontenac has the darkest skies in Southern Ontario. Enjoy them and ensure that our wildlife at the lake can also live in the environment that they are entitled to! If you are interested, the North Frontenac Astronomy park is one of the best places for stargazing in all of Ontario.

Some tips for responsible lighting

Here are some practical ways to practice responsible lighting so that we can all enjoy our dark skies:

- ⇒ Use down lights only with all outdoor lights with shields; turned off when not needed for safety
- ⇒ Cover solar lights when not needed for safety
- ⇒ No spotlights shining into the lake or onto the dock which reflect into the lake and other properties
- ⇒ Turn off/remove dock lights disruptive to the environment and everyone's enjoyment of the dark skies

Your Questions Answered!

Question: What are the township guidelines for maintaining a natural shoreline?

The Township of North Frontenac, with the support of the Mississippi Valley Conservation Authority, along with the KLA, fully support maintaining natural shorelines on our lakes to the maximum extent possible. The North Frontenac Natural Vegetation Buffer and Waterfront Activity Bylaw 3.29.1 (https://frontenac.civicweb.net/document/261422/) requires that the:

"area from the high water mark extending inland a depth of minimum of 15 metres for the entire width of the lot, shall retain natural vegetation ...subject to limited exception of a waterfront activity area..."

For your reference, here's a summary of **permitted exceptions**:

- One (1) access corridor not greater than 7 metres
- A pathway within the access corridor not greater than 2 metres in width
- Stairs for access to the shoreline are permitted with a maximum width of 2 metres
- Pruning of trees for viewing purposes is permitted
- Removal of dead or diseased trees for safety reasons is permitted
- Stumps should be retained wherever possible
- Clearcutting is prohibited in this area;... selective cutting is permitted in the area commencing at a point 15 metres inland from the high water mark up to 30 metres from the high water mark
- Additional tree removal shall only be permitted where trees are marked for removal by a Licensed Tree Marker

Notice re: KLA Low Wake and Hazard Markers

Each spring, and throughout the season, on behalf of the Kashwakamak Lake Association (KLA), Low Wake and Hazard Markers are placed, and/or checked around the lake in an effort to mark some of the lake's shoals, rocks, boulders, narrow passages etc. While best efforts are made to mark the most hazardous areas, it is not realistic to be able to mark everything, especially in areas that are close to shore or have little boat traffic.



- It is critical that boaters realize that these **MARKERS** are **NOT** navigational buoys. Instead, the markers are intended to call attention to **SOME** of the lake's hazards.
- **EVERY** individual operator of a watercraft is solely responsible for safe boating, including the avoidance of any marked or unmarked water hazards.
- While we try to identify and mark hazards, the KLA is not responsible for ensuring all hazards are marked, or continue to be marked.

UPDATE: Kashwakamak Lake Dam Environmental Assessment

First Community Liaison Committee Meeting held

As you may recall, the KLA is closely following the Environmental Assessment Review of the Kashwaka-mak Lake dam. I am pleased to report that the Mississippi Valley Conservation Authority (MVCA) is making good progress on its Environmental Assessment Review for the future of the dam over the Mississippi River at the eastern end of our lake. On February 26, the MVCA and its Consultants Egis presented preliminary findings to the first meeting of the Community Liaison Committee (CLC) established to provide input into the review.

The CLC includes North Frontenac Mayor Gerry Lichty; representatives of the KLA, Directors Alan Dean and Andrew Johnston; three other KLA members who are lake cottage owners, Michael Fenton, Lawrence Flynn and Bernie Harrigan; and a representative of the Hiawatha First Nation, Tom Cowie, Lands/Resources Consultation.

Lisa Marshall, the project manager at Egis, led the presentation. She reviewed the areas examined by the study team: the natural and social environment of the dam; archaeological and heritage assessments; hydrological studies upstream and downstream of the dam, and a structural evaluation of the dam itself. One consideration is maintaining maintaining water levels for the Manòmin (wild rice fields) which has a cultural significance to the Ardoch Algonquin First Nation, Alderville First Nation and potentially other First Nations.

The study team then examined five alternatives: (1) do nothing - make no changes at this time; (2) demolish and decommission the existing dam and either construct a passive system (such as an overflow weir system) or reinstate the natural watercourse; (3) rehabilitate the existing dam; (4) demolish the existing dam and replace it

with a new dam at the same location; (5) demolish the existing dam and replace it with a new dam built across the Mississippi River a short distance downstream.

Good news!

Based on an initial evaluation, the recommended technically preferred alternative is **Alternative 4 - replace the existing dam at the same location**. This alternative will enable the MVCA to maintain current water levels and flows upstream and downstream of the dam and provide additional capacity to handle major storms and future climate change events, with no adverse environmental impact.

Next steps

After a good discussion, the members of the CLC expressed broad support for rebuilding the dam at its present location. Egis and the MVCA emphasized that this alternative was the currently recommended alternative and will be confirmed following further consultation with agencies, stakeholders, First Nations, interest groups and the public.

Community Meeting next week!

On **Thursday May 23 from 4:00 – 6:00 pm**, the MVCA and its consultants will hold a **virtual Public Information Session** on the Kashwakamak Lake Dam EA. This will allow agencies, stakeholders and the general public to comment on the study's progress, the alternatives reviewed and the preferred solution. Selection of the technically preferred alternative will be made upon the completion of this stage of consultation and the remaining studies. The EA review should be completed this year, followed by a formal notice of project completion. Detailed design, tendering and contract selection will proceed during 2025. Demolition and reconstruction will probably not start before 2026.



Lake Sustainability Implementation Update

MVCA Tree Planting Program for Kashwakamak Lake – Healthy Shorelines!

The KLA is delighted to participate in Mississippi Valley Conservation Authority's (MVCA) Tree Planting Program. The response from both KLA members and other property owners on the lake was great. In all, 21 KLA members are participating and 11 non-members with an order of **543 trees and bushes!** In addition, several KLA members are participating MVCA's Shoreline Planting Program and will have site visits this spring. The KLA made a **\$10 donation** for every KLA member participating, for a total of **\$210** to their Wetlands and Stewardship programs.


